Program Description

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), children between the ages of 0-19 are at greatest risk for traumatic brain injury (TBI) and it is the leading cause of disability and death in this age group. Long and short-term effects are now well documented with after effects that can manifest well into adulthood. This workshop will provide health care providers with the ability to recognize the scope of issues and impact on the lives of those children affected by TBI and be able to support these patients on their road to recovery.

Outcome

- Recognize the cognitive and communication issues that result from TBI
- Identify strategies to support both the pediatric TBI patient as well as the caregiver
- Articulate the different types of pediatric TBI, the ensuing sequelae, and evidence based practice management options

This approach is meant to assist the family in decompressing from stressors so that they can begin healing and work towards self-management of this potentially chronic health condition.

Abusive head trauma is the leading cause of death from traumatic brain injury in infants and the leading cause of death from physical abuse in the United States. Approximately 30 percent of abusive head trauma are missed when caretakers provide inaccurate histories or when infants have nonspecific symptoms such as vomiting or fussiness. Missed diagnoses can be catastrophic. This session will review abusive head trauma, previously called "shaken Baby syndrome", the causes, risks and medical evaluation to detect this preventable cause of injury

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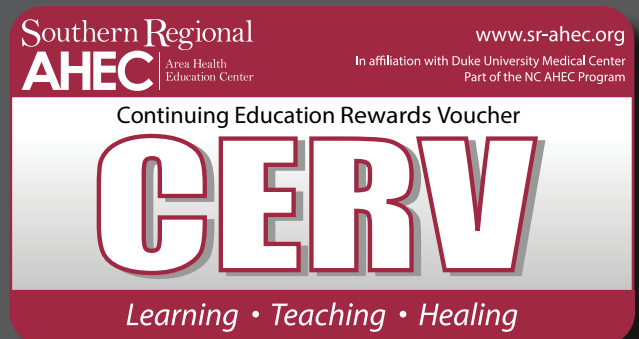
